Remembering Who We Are: Made in the Image of God Passages from Bishop's Episcopal Address to 2023 Iowa Annual Conference

In her inaugural episcopal address at the 2023 Iowa UMC's Annual Conference, Bishop Kennetha J. Bigham-Tsai encouraged the body to respond to the challenges facing the church not with anger or retribution but with healing, reconciliation, and love. She emphasized her commitment to #BeUMC, going deep in spiritual formation and Christian discipleship, focusing outward, and making hope real. Bigham-Tsai told the body that she wants to put Iowa on the map and demonstrate how God's hope can be made real through faithful leaders, fruitful communities, and fire-filled people. Here is a sample from her remarks:

"I have seen the ministry that you do—Iowa—the people that you are. I have seen you. I have seen the worry lines in the faces of our clergy and the tired and haggard looks of some of our laity. I have seen and heard the discouragement, the anger, the grief, and the trauma of an ongoing fight that is ending in a painful divorce. But I have also seen the hope and the joy on the faces of young clergywomen chatting away at dinner at the Primrose Cafe in Corning. I have been a part of animated, theological conversations around a fire pit in the backyard of young pastors as we discussed the ministry of Nourished, a spiritual community, and a gluten-free bakery. And, I have seen laity gather (on Laity Day) in their commitment to racial justice, inspired by stories of racial healing. I have seen you at the Iowa Annual Conference, and this is what I know...I know that you are all made in the image of God and that you are good."

Empowered by the Holy Spirit, "Disciples of Jesus . . . welcome all people to the table of God's mercy and combat the scourge of racism and homophobia and transphobia and misogyny because we recognize that all persons are made in the image of God, no matter their race, or gender, or gender identity or sexuality,"

"And when it comes to our call to be a grace-filled church, amidst the divisions and disagreements of our time, this is what we must know. We must know that it doesn't matter who is right or thinks they are right. It only matters if we are loving. It doesn't matter who is right or thinks they are right. It only matters if we are welcoming, and it does not matter who is right or thinks they are right. It only matters that we see the image of God, the likeness of Christ and all people and be Christ to all. Friends to do any of this. We're going to have to go deep spiritually."

"We must go a mile deep in the intentional formation of disciples of Jesus Christ, who can meet the test of these times, disciples who can deal with the complexities of these times, disciples who can meet the divisions of these times."

"God made us together as a beloved community, as a holy connection, as the body of Christ called United Methodist. And after, God made us and formed us into the connectional body that is the Iowa annual conference. Do you know what God said? Es bueno—It is good—C'est bon—It is good—Johda—It is good—Nimzur'i—It is good—Lahat Muh Ayos—it is all very good! Iowa Annual Conference, remember who you are. Amen."

Special Offering for August Ingathering Kits

The "noisy offering" on August 13 will be used to buy supplies for the School Kits and the Personal Dignity Kits (20 of each). Donations of money are appreciated for supplies and shipping and handling. Last year the Administrative Board voted to use the August "noisy offering" collection to buy items for the yearly Midwest Mission Ingathering kits due November 2023.

Ingathering is a United Methodist Women in Faith project. Non-profit organizations supported by the Ingathering include Heifer International, Church World Service, Mobility Worldwide, Midwest Mission, and Self-Help International, which partners with communities in Ghana and Nicaragua to offer agricultural extension training, nutritional education, micro-credit loans for rural women, development of small businesses, access to clean drinking water, and 4-H style youth ag programs.

In the Meeting Room is a list of needed items for the Ingathering kits. We will maintain a tally of donated supplies. The cost of handling and shipping 40 kits is \$80. The cost to include a razor and toothpaste in each Personal Dignity Kit is \$40. If you would like to donate to Heifer International, please write Heifer International on your check or attach a note with your cash.
