Marlene Himes (1936-2023)

Marlene Joan (Mitchell) Himes ended her mission work on earth on Jan. 9, 2023. Marlene was born on Feb. 10, 1936, to Victor



and Eldred Mitchell in Richland Center, Wis. She graduated from Richland Center High School in 1953. After graduating she worked at the Edwards Clinic in Richland Center. On April 23, 1955, she married her high school sweetheart, Fred Himes, and they moved to Cedar Rapids. In 1958, she and Fred made their home in Hiawatha, where they have lived ever since.

In 1965, Marlene started her career at the Hiawatha School Food Service, where she retired as a manager in 1998. She held many office positions in the Cedar Rapids Food Service Association and attended many national conventions.

Marlene was a proud member of Buffalo United Methodist Church, where she played the piano for over 60 years. She held every position possible on the church board and was an active member of the United Methodist Women at local, district, and state levels.

Marlene spent tireless hours helping and caring for family, friends, and even strangers. Those left to cherish Marlene's memory are Fred, her husband of 67 years; her children, Vince (Marsha) Himes of Cedar Rapids and Dawn (Michael) Morgan of Lisbon, Iowa; her sisters, Meredith (Bill) Morgan and Glenda (Don) Dobbs; five grandchildren, Nicci Himes, Jolene (JD) Dunham, Adam (Cari) Morgan, Chase (Kaleigh) Morgan, and Marshall (Liz Foster) Morgan; 16 great-grandchildren; one great-great-grandchild; her neighbor-sister, Jean; and her church family. She was preceded in death by her parents, her sister Gloria Jewett, and a grandson, McKale Morgan.

A visitation was held at the Cedar Memorial Park Chapel Stateroom on Friday, Jan. 13. The funeral service was at the Cedar Memorial Park Chapel of Memories with Pastor Carol Mart officiating. Interment was at the Cedar Memorial Park Cemetery-Garden of Tranquility, followed by a luncheon at Buffalo. Memorial contributions may be made in her name to Hall-Perrine Cancer Center, in honor of Dr. Stroh, Hospice of Mercy, and/or Buffalo UMC.

A Conversation with Marlene

This conversation was recorded in April 2016 as we were preparing for Buffalo's 140th anniversary celebration.

Q: How did you end up attending Buffalo?

I was raised in Richland Center, Wisconsin. My mother's parents belonged to the first Norwegian Methodist Church in Wisconsin. Fred and I moved to Hiawatha in 1958 and started going to Buffalo in early '59. Sam Hahn was the minister at that time. Our son and Fred were baptized in the Church. The congregation was probably 25-30 people. But there were other children and our children started attending Sunday School at Buffalo.

Neva Weiss had been playing the piano and the organ. We decided that I would play the piano and she would play the organ. And that's what we did. We played together for over 40 years. Nobody ever told us what we were going to play. We would just wing it. I took lessons when I was in 7th & 8th grade. I played for the choir in high school, and I learned how to sight read hymns. Unfortunately, I never learned how to read chords. I have to have every note written out.

At Buffalo, we used to have over 100 children attend Vacation Bible School. I can't figure where they managed to put all those kids in that small church. And we used to have a nice choir. We had a gal, Nancy, who was a singer, and she loved to sing solos, and she could tell us what to do. This is a good singing congregation—if they know the song. We have people who love to sing, even if they can't read music.

After Rev. Hahn, Gil Dawes became our pastor. He had been a missionary in Argentina, and he preached Liberation Theology. That made more sense than anything I had ever heard. For ten years we would have Bible Study every week, and he was always there—and I still agree with Liberation Theology. I learned a lot from him. But a lot of people left at that time, they were mad, and it was so sad.

I liked the decision to move to the new church building. Fred said the move was a "win/win" situation. And it has turned out to be true. We had so much mold in the old church, and it was so unhealthy. And all the problems carrying things up and down the stairs to the basement. It was such a struggle.

This building was empty. The first day we interviewed Jenny, the District Superintendent was there and Chris and George were there. They had gone to Faith before it closed, and they had started going to Buffalo. Chris just said to the District Superintendent, "What are you going to do with Faith?" And he said "Do you want it?" And she said "Yes!" So Jenny had this problem right away. It was tough to convince people, but it was just a building-and now we can't go back.

Q: How did you become head of the Trustees? That was a mistake! I was on the nominating committee, but no one would take it. I was hoping it would not be a big deal, but it has become a big deal. I don't like to deal with conflict. We only have one contractor I have to work with on the kitchen remodeling, but he won't finish his jobs. They just have a little left to do. Why don't they come and finish the job? I just don't understand.

We are hoping that people will start using the church for various kinds of activities. For example, our great-granddaughter is going to use it for her postgraduation party. We have a nice, big area. My favorite food to bring? Something in a crockpot. My mom always made Swedish meatballs, and that's what I like to make.

Q: What are six words you would use to describe Buffalo? Friendship, people you can count on. Camaraderie. One of the attractions of the church: we keep it simple.

Candlemas: February 2

This day is known as the feast of the Presentation of the Lord Jesus and the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The feast celebrates the presentation of Jesus in the temple as recorded in the Gospel of Luke (2:22-40). Snowdrops (*Galanthas nivalis*) are flowers known as Candlemas Bells because they often bloom early in the year (though not this early in Iowa). According to folklore, an angel helped these Candlemas bells bloom and relieve the despair of Eve, who was weeping over the cold and death she had brought into the world. Candles lit during Candlemas symbolize Jesus as the "light of the world," and Candlemas is a day for blessing the candles to be used in the church during the rest of the year.

Given its occurrence at the beginning of February, Candlemas became a day associated with predicting when spring weather would arrive, based on whether the skies were sunny or cloudy.

If Candlemas be fair and bright, Come, Winter, have another flight;

If Candlemas bring clouds and rain,

Go, Winter, and come not again.

Thus Candlemas became Groundhog's Day, when an animal's shadow forecasts the arrival of spring.
