#### And So Shall We

The was a part of every membership inquiry class in twenty-eight years of pastoring United Methodist churches. I would pass out a copy of the Social Principles to each person, and we would go through it together. Oh, how spirited the discussions were!

I decided to become a United Methodist as a young adult in part because I loved John Wesley's insistence that the social aspect of holiness is essential to the Christian faith. In the Preface of Wesley's *Hymns and Sacred Poems* (1739), he writes, "Solitary religion is not to be found there. 'Holy Solitaries' is a phrase no more consistent with the gospel than Holy Adulterers. The gospel of Christ knows of no religion, but social; no holiness but social holiness. Faith working by love, is the length and breadth and depth and height of Christian perfection."

My intent in spending time with the Social Principles was strategic. I wanted those who felt led to become part of United Methodism to understand our roots in both evangelical piety and a passion for imitating Jesus by "preaching good news to the poor, proclaiming release to the prisoners and

recovery of sight to the blind, liberating the oppressed, and proclaiming the year of the Lord's favor." (Luke 4:18-19)

Many times, I would remind participants that United Methodism strives to be a theologically, economically, socially, and spiritually diverse denomination that welcomes people from all walks of life. More than once I used George W. Bush and Hillary Clinton as examples of how United Methodists can belong to different political parties and still claim a common Wesleyan spiritual heritage. Of course, we didn't always agree with one another, but, time and again, I heard these words, "I want to be part of a church that wrestles with integrity about difficult issues, encourages people to come to their own decisions, and honors differences while remaining united in mission."

[After noting that the "Social Principles is one of United Methodism's greatest gifts to Christianity," Haller summarizes the historical evolution of Methodism's Social Creed and highlights passages in a proposed revision of the Social Principles being considered by the General Board of Church and Society. ## Administrative Board Minutes April 18, 2018

- Trustees Report. Marlene said the boiler inspector had come and although there is a small drip, everything is ok. The termite inspector will be here on April 26.
- Window Blinds. The cordless blinds have been ordered from The Blind Factory and will be installed in 2-4 weeks.
- **No Smoking.** Nancy has made the signs, and Gary was assigned the responsibility of getting them up.
- Little Free Library. Bob spoke with Todd Tomkins of TNT Woodworking in Iowa City about constructing an LFL for Buffalo. Todd is working on a design for a library that would resemble the Old Buffalo building on Blairs Ferry.
- Recruiting. There was a lengthy discussion concerning strategies for increasing our church membership. Things we now do include (1) taking "Welcome Bags" to new residents when a home is sold in the area; (2) organizing and advertising such events as the Pancake Breakfast, Annual Yard Sale, Ice Cream Supper, Fall Bazaar, and Trunk or Treat; (3) participating in the Neighbors Night Out project. Our special events are well attended, but attendance at these events has not translated into attendance on Sunday morning.

It was noted that we need to listen to God as the guiding spirit for our actions. We need to recognize and use our strengths to inform our outreach efforts. There was some discussion of developing new activities (such as short-term Sunday School classes) which might appeal to non-members. Pastor Kathryn recommended beginning discernment on an individual level by reading passages in the New Testament (such as the book of Acts, Ephesians, and Colossians) which focus on efforts in stating the first Christian churches.
