#### The Bulbs Have Arrived

In the middle of October we received two crates full of spring-flowering bulbs for our Buffalo landscape. Weather permitting, in early November we will be planting over 750 crocus, daffodil, and tulip bulbs. If you (or any grandchildren) would love to spend a few minutes on your hands and knees putting crocus bulbs into the Buffalo lawn, please contact Bob Marrs, who owns a couple of dibblers ideal for crocus planting.

Also in November, we will be planting four more trees (hornbeam and service berry, both North American natives) around the Labyrinth. In the Labyrinth we will be sowing wild flower seeds and planting several native ornamental grasses (switch grass, side oats grama, tuft grass, and little bluestem).

Don't forget that Buffalo's Labyrinth is open for prayer, meditation, and reflection seven days a week.





## Administrative Board Report on October Meeting

Here are some of the issues addressed at the meeting of the Administrative Board on October 20:

- In the Trustee's Report it was noted that Gary Hackney has been trimming trees on the Eastern Avenue side of the church and the wiring of the shed is on his schedule. Gary will add some posts on the north edge of the property to prevent the neighbors from driving on church property. The wind chimes have been installed in the Labyrinth.
- Progress has been made in operating the software for the church's electric sign, and a new Lenovo laptop will be purchased for programming the sign's messages.
- Improved security lighting has been installed outside the building. We received a price quote for purchase and installation of a security camera system inside the building, but the Board decided to continue investigating other options.
- The Board approved scheduling a Taizé Service in the first week of Advent and a Bible Study Class for December and January (further details elsewhere in the newsletter).
- In support of the Cedar River First Nations food distribution program, Buffalo will continue to donate cookies for pickup on the Friday before the third weekend of each month. Buffalo will also contribute \$100 from the October Bazaar revenue. It was suggested that we provide envelopes for individuals to donate money whenever we have a group perform at Buffalo.
- The pianos in the worship center and fellowship hall will be tuned later in the fall after the weather temperatures become more consistent.
- Prior to the beginning of a worship service, people need to be reminded to turn off their cell phones.
- Buffalo will have a Christmas Dinner in January and invite Bertram UMC members to attend. The date and catering arrangements for the dinner will be decided at the Board's December meeting.
- It was recently discovered that Buffalo is somehow managing to operate without a copy of the current Book of Discipline (though we do have a 1956 edition of the Evangelical United Brethren Discipline). The Board decided to wait and purchase a printed copy of the Discipline after a new edition is published—which should occur next year.


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## **December Bible Study**

For three Sundays in December (December 5, 12, & 19), a Bible Study group will be meeting immediately after the Worship Service for hot drinks, a few tasty goodies, and a spirited discussion of the nativity stories in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. In preparation for our conversations, we invite everyone to sit down with your favorite Bible translation and read the first two chapters of Matthew and the first two chapters of Luke.

In our Bible Study group we will start by discussing the remarkable differences between these two versions of the birth of Jesus. Some of us may be surprised to discover that one gospel concentrates almost exclusively on one parent (Joseph) and in the other gospel the focus is on the other parent (Mary). We will try to understand what these and other differences reveal about the purposes of each author's nativity narrative and how their messages complement each other.

In January, we will continue with three more Bible Study sessions comparing the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew with the Sermon on the Plain in Luke—with a particular focus on each Gospel's version of the Beatitudes.



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
